Methodology



- Nationally representative phone survey of South Africa (RDD).
- Only registered voters.
- N = 1500.
- Margin of Error: 3% at the 95% confidence interval.
- Fieldwork: 11 September 03 October 2023.
- 15-minute questionnaire.
- Weighted to national statistics on gender, age and province.
- Comparison to a November 2022 Brenthurst/SABI survey.

2024 General Election






80% of respondents indicated they are almost certain to vote in the 2024 election










The ANC wins 41% of the vote, the DA 23%, and the Multi-Party Charter (MPC) 36%








The ANC has dropped 7 points since November 2022 while parties comprising the MPC have gained 2 points








In a 'high turnout scenario', the ANC wins 43% of the vote, the DA 25%, and the MPC 36%








In a 'low turnout scenario', the ANC wins 45% of the vote, the DA 27%, and the MPC 38%








In Gauteng, the ANC sits on 37%, the DA on 24%, and the MPC 37%








In KZN, the ANC sits on 32%, the IFP on 27%, and the MPC 46%








In Western Cape, the DA is polling at 56% and the ANC 22%






29% of respondents indicate that Western Cape – home to 12% of the country's population – is SA's best governed province



Which province do you believe is best governed?




More respondents believe Western Cape, Gauteng and Mpumalanga are better governed than in November 2022





Which province do you believe is best governed?




29% of respondents believe the City of Cape Town is South Africa's best governed metro





Which metro do you believe is best governed?




Buffalo City has seen the biggest improvement in terms of governance amongst metros, according to respondents






Which metro do you believe is best governed?



30% of respondents believe the ANC is the party most effective at governing, just ahead of the DA on 29%




Which party do you believe is the most effective at governing?

Which party do you believe is the most effective at governing?




46% of respondents describe their last interaction with a government official as positive






How would you describe your last interaction with a government official (like a police officer, healthcare worker or home affairs official)?



28% of respondents would characterise their last interaction with a government official as negative, compared with 22% in November 2022




How would you describe your last interaction with a government official (like a police officer, healthcare worker or home affairs official)?



41% of respondents believe government officials earn too much




Do you think that government officials earn too much, too little, or the right amount?



Attitudes towards the pay of government officials have only moved marginally




Do you think that government officials earn too much, too little, or the right amount?



4 out of 5 South Africans agree the private sector should be allowed to participate in providing services like energy, ports and rail









More South Africans today would like to see the involvement of the private sector in the provision of services than in November 2022



What do you think is the biggest problem facing South Africa right now?




Most South Africans hold the ANC government of the past three decades responsible for their issues of concern






Cyril Ramaphosa enjoys the highest positive favourability rating of politicians tested








Cyril Ramaphosa's positive favourability has dropped 6 points since November last year while Julius Malema's has risen by 6 points







Julius Malema is viewed most unfavourably amongst politicians tested









The DA (37%) is now viewed more favourably than than ANC (36%)








The DA's positive favourability has increased by 7 points since November last year, while the ANC's has decreased by 3 points





Strongly and somewhat favourable: Political parties




The EFF is the most unfavourable political party amongst those that were tested




Three-quarters of respondents would be happy to see a coalition govern South Africa





Would you be happy to see a coalition of parties govern South Africa?




The idea of a coalition governing South Africa is less favourable than it was last year






Would you be happy to see a coalition of parties govern South Africa?

Do you think a broad coalition involving lots of different parties can effectively govern South Africa?




Respondents in favour of a coalition are divided over which formation of coalition they would prefer





Which coalition would you prefer to govern the country?








Is it more important to vote for what you want, rather than against what you do not?



Half of South Africa is familiar with the Multi-Party Charter







Close to a quarter of South Africans are more likely to vote for an opposition party following the MPC launch










John Steenhuisen is the preferred candidate amongst respondents to run the Multi-Party Charter






More respondents favour aligning with democracies and the West than to the BRICS







Summary of key findings



- If an election were to be held tomorrow, the ANC would not achieve an outright majority.
- The ANC has dropped 7 points since November 2022, from 48% to 41%.
- Parties of the Multi-Party Charter have a combined total support of 36% and are ahead in KZN, the Western Cape and Gauteng.
- The vast majority of respondents (74%) would be happy to see a coalition of parties govern South Africa.
- President Cyril Ramaphosa's favourability rating has fallen since November 2022, from 48% to 42%.
- The EFF has gained support from 11% in November 2022 to 17% today.
- Most respondents hold the ANC government of the past three decades responsible for South Africa's problems.
- Close to a quarter of South Africans (24%) are more likely to vote for an opposition party following the Multi-Party Charter launch.
- More respondents favour aligning to democracies and the West (40%) than to the BRICS (28%).

Analysis of key findings



- A coalition government is more likely than 12 months ago, with ANC support dropping from 48% to 41%.
- The ANC faces serious political competition with the formation of the Multi-Party Charter (MPC), an alliance of opposition parties that includes the DA, IFP, Action SA and FF+, with a five point difference between the combined vote of the MPC and the ANC.
- Although the MPC had been in existence for less than two months at the time of this survey, half of respondents
 recognised its brand. A quarter of respondents said they were more likely to vote for an opposition party following
 the launch of the MPC. This suggests there may be significant voter support upside in greater name recognition for
 the MPC and greater clarity on its policy focus and narrative.
- South Africans still prefer association with the West and other democracies over the BRICS, calling South Africa's foreign policy investment in the BRICS into question.
- Rising support for the EFF and declining support for the ANC portends a greater possibility of an EFF-ANC coalition,
 raising questions for the moderate centre about its political options.
